



DENTAL HYGIENE

JOB DESCRIPTION

□ Because each state has specific regulations regarding the responsibilities of dental hygienists, the range of services will vary from state to state. Some of the patient care services performed by dental hygienists may include:

- patient screening procedures such as preliminary review of the health history, dental charting, oral inspections, and taking and recording blood pressure
- exposing and developing x-rays
- teaching patients oral hygiene measures to maintain healthy teeth and gums
- counseling patients about the contribution good nutrition makes to oral health
- applying cavity-preventive agents such as fluoride and sealants
- cleaning teeth
- making impressions of patients' teeth for study used by dentists to evaluate patient treatment needs
- counseling patients about the need for regularly scheduled preventive dental care

CAREER PROFILE

□ Dental hygienists are important members of the health care team. These professionals use their knowledge and clinical skills to provide dental hygiene care for patients and to instruct them on methods to improve and maintain oral health.

Dental hygiene offers solid career opportunities, preparing graduates to provide dental hygiene care to patients in dental offices, clinics, and educational or health care institutions. Additional education and experience may prepare dental hygienists for a variety of other career opportunities.

The dentist and the dental hygienist work together to meet the oral health needs of each patient. Dental hygienists are usually employed in general dental practices or in specialty practices such as pediatric dentistry and periodontics (treatment of diseases of the gums and the supporting bones of the teeth).

Dental hygienists also may be employed to provide dental hygiene services prescribed by dentists for patients in hospitals, nursing homes, and public health clinics.

EMPLOYMENT


□ In addition to career opportunities within dental offices, depending on the level of education and experience they have achieved, dental hygienists can apply their skills and knowledge in other career activities including office management, business administration, dental hygiene education, research, and marketing of dentally-related materials and equipment.

CAREER OUTLOOK

□ The median annual wage for dental hygienists was \$74,820 in May 2018, according to the U.S. Department of Labor. Salaries and benefits may vary according to the hygienist's experience and responsibilities, geographic location, and the type of practice or other setting in which the hygienist works.

Employment of dental hygienists is expected to grow 11 percent by 2028.

ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE IN ALLIED HEALTH PRE-DENTAL HYGIENE

 Southern Adventist University's Pre-Dental Hygiene program is the first step to becoming a dental hygienist. A bachelor's degree in this area requires four years of college work, and most schools offering it require two years of study at a liberal arts college to meet entrance requirements into their programs.

By completing this two-year degree at Southern, a student meets the admission requirements for the Dental Hygiene program at Loma Linda University. Additionally, Southern's program can be modified for students wishing to meet entrance requirements for three-year dental hygiene options at other schools.
