In the past 5 years the schools that qualify for Adventist Edge designation have grown by 10 percent while the student enrollment in the union as a whole dropped by about 5 percent. There is a very strong commitment on the part of the union officers to not stand by allowing school enrollment declines, while at the same time we are growing in church membership.

I am looking forward to Christmas at my daughter's house in Nashville. It should be a great Christmas celebration.
