# CONNECTING WITH EACH OTHER

## UNIVERSITY PROGRAM ENCOURAGING LUNCHTIME INTERACTION WITH COWORKERS, STUDENTS WORTH MORE THAN \$100,000

The Student Faculty Fellowship Initiative, a program encouraging employees to eat with students or coworkers by paying for their meals, is about to complete its second year. The last day for the program is May 10. Administrators will decide if the initiative can continue in the fall pending budget discussions over the summer. This year, roughly 16,500 meals were provided at a value approaching \$115,000.
