# Sauder Selected as New President of Union College

The move comes after 25 years of teaching and administrative work for Southern, 16 of which were at the cabinet level. She began her duties at Union College July 1.

During her time at Southern, Sauder was instrumental in affecting many positive changes. Among these are an unprecedented increase in enrollment and the creation of a Vision 20/20 Strategic Plan.
