Jessica Spears presented at the Digital Commons Southeastern User Group Annual Meeting on June 1, held on the campus of East Tennessee State University. Her presentation was titled "Art in the Library: Using the Digital Commons Platform to Preserve Library Exhibits."

DEPARTMENTAL NEWS

Stephanie Guster, Kristie Wilder, and Rachel Williams-Smith were awarded a \$50,000 grant from Lumina Foundation for their multipronged project addressing racial justice and equity on campus. Project components include: recording and sharing oral histories, inviting nationally-recognized speakers to Southern, funding creative studentled programs, and researching the impact of all these efforts on employee and student attitudes. On May 21, Southern's Enactus team was awarded second place in its league at the Enactus National Exposition. This is the highest the Southern Enactus team has placed to date, and it ranks them in the top seven percent of the 444 Enactus teams in the United States. Enactus exists to develop entrepreneurial projects that improve the lives of

people and communities. This year's team worked on projects such as restoring eyesight to the blind in India, closing the technology gender gap by teaching teen girls computer coding, improving food deserts through agriculture education, and assisting the immigrant population here in Chattanooga.

On April 26 and 27, the **School of Nursing's** eight-bed skills lab turned into a Multi-Patient Interprofessional Collaborative Practice Intensive Care Unit. During the event, students from various departments worked shifts:

- Level 4 nursing students (63) provided hands-on patient care.
- Nurse practitioner (8) and pre-med (8) students saw patients, ordered diagnostic labs, and were on-call.
- Social work students (22) were case managers and provided emotional and psychosocial care and support to the "patients" and "family members."
- A religion student served as chaplain, providing spiritual care and support to the "patients" and "family members."
- Lights Volunteers (12) and BSN -Leadership/Research students (4) played the roles of patients and/or family members.

At the conclusion of the simulation, the students participated in a debrief session and completed a survey. Of the 94 participants who completed the survey, 86 percent strongly agreed/agreed this multi-patient simulation should be repeated in the future, and 84 percent strongly agreed/agreed this simulation experience will be beneficial for their future work environment. The team plans to continue providing this learning experience every fall and winter semester.

HATS OFF!

A big "thank you" to the faculty and staff who made Academic Summer Camps a success. We had 143 students register and 112 attend the June 18-20 immersion experience. Both are record numbers! And that doesn't even include the 15 additional students from the Chattanooga Girls Leadership Academy who participated in off-campus components of our Civic Engagement camp. The parents I met over these three days consistently had glowing words to say about their introduction to the Southern Experience—that's a big win for our campus—in addition to how the students responded (camper surveys were overwhelmingly positive). I'm humbled and grateful for the opportunity to step outside of my traditional job responsibilities and project manage these camps. It was a joy to work with you all! Please join me in praying that God will continue to direct these students' lives toward the calling He has planned for each of them.
