### SOUTHERN CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Southern is proud to be ranked **number one for diversity** among universities in the South by U.S. News and World Report Best Colleges. Throughout February, Southern will be celebrating Black History Month, which is a **long-standing tradition on campus**. It was in the 1970s that Southern first set aside time to honor the diversity and richness of African American heritage. Since then, Southern has enjoyed an increasingly diverse student body, with this year's **undergraduate population comprised of 53 percent minority students**.

As part of this year's celebration, the Student Association is hanging special banners along the Promenade, recognizing influential African Americans from Southern and across the country. Similar banners will be hung for Asian History Month and Latin American History Month.

Another special event will be a free concert by the **Fisk Jubilee Singers on February 10** at 6 p.m. in the Collegedale Church of Seventh-day Adventists. Fisk University opened in Nashville in 1866 as the first American institution to offer a liberal arts education to "young men and women irrespective of color."

### STUDENTS JOIN IN WORLDWIDE PRAYER EVENT

Southern students joined in prayer with the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists during the worldwide "10 Days of Prayer." Each of the 10 days, eleven small groups gathered around Southern's campus for 15 minutes of scripture reading and prayer. Participants brought many subjects before God, including asking His Spirit to move in a special way within the international church and on campus.

### **DEPARTMENTAL NEWS**

The **School of Nursing** transformed its skills lab into a nine-bed intensive care unit (ICU) for the multi-patient intraand interprofessional collaborative practice simulation,
November 2-3. Eighty nursing students and nine pre-med students were the healthcare providers for three-hour and five-hour shifts. They provided continuous care to the nine "patients" (Lights Volunteers) and "family members" for the 10 hours on Thursday and six hours on Friday. Additionally, there were three students who served in the roles of the charge nurse, pharmacist, and unit secretary in the ICU. Data was collected during the debrief and the majority of the participants found the simulation to be beneficial to their future practice.

On November 30, many different departments and schools on campus came together for the **School of Nursing's** 5th emergency preparedness interprofessional collaborative practice simulation (EP IPCP). There were 129 participants including nursing, education, and religion students; volunteers; faculty and staff; and Campus Safety. The event simulated the aftermath of a disaster. Of the 79 participants who have completed the survey, 62 percent agree or strongly agree that they can now better contribute to their community.
