Our nation's leaders are emphasizing the importance of service within local communities in the belief that service as a way of life for all Americans is key to the future of our country.

In his speech that launched the service initiative "United We Serve", President Barack Obama said, "I'm calling on all of you to make volunteerism and community service part of your daily life and the life of this nation. And when I say "all," I mean everyone - young and old, from every background, all across this country. We need individuals, community organizations, corporations, foundations, and our government to be part of this effect."

Ellen White also encourages us to put service into practice when she acknowledges that, "in the cities of America there are people of almost every language. These need the light that God has given to His church" (Testimonies for the Church, vol. 8, p. 36). She also assures us that, "much must be done in behalf of the foreigners who have come to the shores of our own land.... God's people are also to fulfill their duty toward the foreigners of various nationalities in the cities and villages and county districts close by" (Christian Service, p. 199).

As a Christian institution of higher learning, Southern Adventist University provides excellent opportunities for students to engage in service projects. The Modern Languages Department's Community Outreach Project allows students to participate in community outreach as part of the course curriculum at Southern.

Community service with organizations not listed below must be approved by the instructor. The following should be turned in according to the schedule on the syllabus:

A Community Outreach Project Evaluation Form should be completed and signed by the supervisor where community service is performed verifying a total of 10-12 hrs.

A report should be completed which is a minimum of two pages, double-spaced and typed, about your cultural encounter during this activity. You may write about your reaction, your reflection, and your feedback. The following questions should guide the direction of your report:

- Highlight one or two personal changes you experienced.
- What did you learn about the organization?
- How does the organization relate to the community in which it is located?
- How effective do you believe the organization is in responding to the needs people have for the services it provides?
- Would you recommend this experience to other students?
