Caring-Connecting-Empowering

Interdisciplinary Simulation became a reality during the Winter 2023 semester for the School of Nursing and the Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) students. Collaboration between the two departments began in the fall of 2022. The simulation coordinator, Cindy Johnson, EdD, MSN, RN, worked with Amanda Patton, DPT, an associate professor in the PTA program, to develop a simulation experience that paired undergraduate nursing and PTA students. The scenario depicted an orthopedic standardized patient (a real-life person), allowing for the realism of working with someone requiring assistance with mobility and ambulation. The patient experienced pain, the PTA students contacted the nurse, and the students worked together to improve the patient's situation. The students from both programs reported how beneficial this was to their learning about working with other disciplines and understanding the value of collaboration to enhance the patient's experience. The School of Nursing looks forward to additional interdisciplinary simulation experiences with the Physical Therapist Assistant program in upcoming semesters. The School of Nursing motto, Christ-Centered Excellence: Caring - Connecting – Empowering, became a reality,

equipping these students with practical and hands-on skills in working with another discipline as part of their preparation to enter the healthcare system.

Costa Rica Mission Trip

A t midnight on May 11, 2023, a bus carrying 25 nursing, premedical, allied health, and theology students left the university on a mission trip to Limon, Costa Rica. This trip united the medical and evangelism expertise of the Southern's School of Nursing and the School of Religion's Evangelism Resource Center.

Inspiration for this new venture came from statements such as this: "Nothing will open doors for the truth like evangelistic medical



missionary work. This will find access to hearts and minds, and will be a means of converting many to the truth" (Ellen G. White, Evangelism, p. 513).

Under the supervision of Obadias Marquez, MD, and Holly Gadd, FNP, in addition to a few local providers, the team ran medical clinics for four days, caring for more than 700 patients during that time. Laboratory testing, provider visits, patient education, vitamins and medications, and minor surgical procedures were part of each busy day at the clinic.



Each of the students assigned to churches for follow-up evangelistic meetings prepared sermons to present. One nurse practitioner student shared with me that while the clinic time was good, she was most moved by the evangelism portion of the trip, during which God touched her heart and she felt a wonderful connection with the people.

These trips allow students to touch the lives of others, and equally important are the changes that happen in their own hearts and lives as they minister through missions.

Giving Day Success

Planning for Giving Day 2023 was intimidating. We'd had tremendous success in 2022 as we celebrated the legacy of 90-year-old Bonnie Hunt, who touched thousands of lives during her 45 years as a professor in the School of Nursing (SON). We raised \$65,763 in donations and prizes. How would we ever come close to matching that in 2023?

Then the idea came. This year, we would celebrate two SON employees who were retiring at the end of the school year.

We started our campaign with a fun "Jam with Pam" kickoff event, where we celebrated Pam Gammenthaler's 17 years of service by printing souvenir \$17 bills, serving pizza and ice cream, holding fun giveaways and competitions, and even playing a lively game of musical chairs.

In honor of the 25 years Conni Cash has served as office manager in the SON, we launched the theme Ca\$h for Cash. We printed signs to place around campus, put up a banner, and

designed \$25 bills with Conni's picture on the front and a picture of AdventHealth Hall on the back.

The 2023 Giving Day, which celebrated two women who have touched many lives and helped so many Southern students, was a great success. We raised a total of \$30,302.22 in donations and prizes. Thank you, alumni and friends, for your tremendous support and for helping us tell Pam and Conni how much we all love them and wish them a happy retirement!







Miller Hall

Within our lovely building, AdventHealth Hall, are two small simulation rooms with a control room between, plus an additional corner of the skills lab that is used for pediatric simulation. Professor LaShawn Horton, who teaches OB, uses simulation during her class periods to engage students



and illustrate concepts. For many semesters she has had to move simulation equipment from one room to another through a doorway that is not quite adequate for the manikin and bed.

The good news is that the university will solve this problem by creating a new nursing simulation center. Over the next year, Miller Hall—the building next door, on the other side of the Garden of Prayer—will be transformed for this purpose.

An older building that has housed various academic departments over the years, Miller Hall was for many years a home for the School of Religion, with a nice chapel and baptistry. The baptistry will have to go (although we did consider whether it might be suitable as an underwater birthing area). The large chapel, however, will become a large simulation classroom in which the equipment will permanently reside. The School of Nursing will also benefit from construction of additional simulation and conference rooms on the first floor. Last but not least, a special study and lounge area dedicated to Bonnie Hunt will make this a showcase and practical building for learning.


