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Bryan Aalborg Speaks for 2016 Candidate Recognition

Bryan Aalborg spoke for the Candidate Recognition Weekend September 23 and 24, 2016. Aalborg, lead pastor for the Sharon SDA Church in Charlotte, North Carolina, inspired and challenged the 22 ministerial candidates as the School of Religion faculty and students gathered for these special meetings. Friday evening, in a sermon titled "Glory: Greater than You . . .," he explored Moses' plea to God in Exodus 33:18: "Please show me your glory." He exhorted his listeners to be intentional about seeking God's glory.

During the early service on Sabbath morning, Aalborg drew on his 33 years of pastoral ministry experience in a message titled "Everyday Life: What Classrooms Cannot Provide," to share practical advice for the ministerial candidates looking forward to graduation and ministry. This session also included a question-and-answer period, during which Aalborg answered a variety of questions from School of Religion students.

For the Candidate Recognition service on Sabbath morning at 11 a.m., Aalborg's title was "Glory: Deeper than you . . .,"



and his text was John 17:24: "Father, I desire that they also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory that you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world." To conclude this service the religion faculty gathered around the ministerial candidates for a special prayer of dedication. These candidates are seniors who have completed stated academic and practical requirements and have been approved by the SOR faculty as eligible to interview with conferences for pastoral positions.

Candidate Recognition speaker Bryan Aalborg is a Southern Adventist University graduate who later earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas. His dissertation was titled "Clarity and Compassion: Preaching to Achieve the Formation of a Local Church Policy Which Affirms Grace and Transformation to Homosexuals." The Sharon Seventh-day Adventist Church, which he serves as lead pastor, is a multi-cultural congregation, with nearly 50 countries of origin represented. Approximately 70% of its 400 attendees are active in at least one of the church's 38 ministries, which includes a radio station.

Candidates and attendees were challenged, not only by Aalborg's messages and his deep spiritual commitment, but also by his recreational activities, which have included bicycling across the United States from San Francisco to Charleston, and completing the Dallas Marathon and the Augusta 70.3 half-IRONMAN triathlon.

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Farewell to Mary Anne Poulson

Institute for the Study of Ellen G. White and Adventist Heritage Features Adventist Historian George Knight

Tr. George Knight, one of the most influential voices in Adventism over the last 30 years, spoke to the faculty and students October 26 and 27, 2016. At the Wednesday evening banquet for the Institute for the Study of Ellen G. White and Adventist Heritage, Knight spoke on the multivolume Adventist Pioneer series he is editing for Pacific Press. Books have already been released on the lives of James White, Joseph Bates, J. N. Loughborough, and others. He specifically mentioned the recently published volume by Dr. Ben McArthur on A. G. Daniells and the forthcoming one on D. M. Canright by Dr. Jud Lake, both faculty at Southern.

At Thursday morning convocation, Knight spoke to the student body on the subject of "Why Be Adventist?" He discussed the Millerite origins of the Adventist Church as foretold in Revelation 10 and the prophetic identity of the church in Daniel and Revelation. For him, being an Adventist makes a difference. George Knight is always an engaging speaker with a unique style that captures the hearts and minds of his audiences. He continues to be an influential voice within the church during his retirement from teaching at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary.

Several of Knight's most popular books include Reading Ellen White: How to Understand and Apply her Writings (1997); Ellen White's World: A Fascinating Look at the Times in which She Lived (1998); A Search for Identity: The Development of Seventh-day Adventist Beliefs (2000); The Cross of Christ: God's Work For Us (2008); The Apocalyptic Vision and the Neutering of Adventism (2008); and Sin and Salvation: God's Work for Us and in Us (2009).



Pierson Institute of Evangelism and Mission Weekend Welcomes Roger Hernandez

Every year the Pierson Institute of Evangelism and World Mission hosts a weekend which focuses on the mission and message of the Adventist Church. This last November the speaker was Roger Hernandez, Southern Union Evangelism and Ministerial Director.

Pastor Hernandez was invited, not only because of his expertise in evangelism, but also because of his close mentoring relationship with Edgar Alquinta, who was being ordained as a minister on the same weekend.

The theme of the weekend was the call of Moses to ministry. Pastor Hernandez was able to blend stirring challenges with humorous personal stories. On Friday he talked about the people of Israel at the Red Sea, and their desire to go back to Egypt. He emphasised that when people are in crisis, they resort to what they know, even when that is dysfunctional.

On Sabbath morning his first message was titled "Whatever," which is the one-word prayer that tells God that even though we may not feel qualified, if He calls us, we need to respond and go. His final message dealt with the cost of leadership, which is criticism. He told the students that sometimes criticism will be personal, irrational, and painful. When God chooses individulas for leadership, there will be a cost. The weekend was a reminder that God takes His children through crises and not out of them.

Faculty News

Stephen Bauer, professor of Theology and Ethics, presented a paper titled "'What Is His Name, and What Is His Son's Name?' Proverbs 30:4 and the Trinity" at the Adventist Theological Society meetings, in San Antonio, Texas. *Perspective Digest* (www.perspectivedigest.org), a ministry of Adventist Theological Society which takes scholarly articles from its members and condenses them for the lay reader, will be publishing a condensed version of his chapter on theodicy from *Always Prepared*. The article is "How Can God Allow Suffering?"



Michael Hasel, professor of Archaeology and Biblical Languages, co-directed The Fourth Expdition to Lachish June 18-July14. He spoke for Annual Council at the General Conference on October 8, focusing on Adventist education. He was the keynote speaker for the 19th AIIAS Annual Theological Forum, "Digging the Scriptures: Light on the Text Coming from the Past" in Manila, Philippines. He also authored the chapter on "The Table of Nations" in Genesis: A Commentary by Jacques Doukhan (Pacific Press, 2016) and the most recent GLOW tract, entitled "Ancient Scrolls Discovered in Forgotten Caves," to be used for literature evangelism around the world.



Jud Lake, professor of Homiletics and Adventist Studies, spoke at the Charlotte Sharon Seventh-day Adventist Church on the subjects of Ellen White, the Bible, and her Civil War visions. Lake's book, A *Nation in God's Hands: Ellen White and the Civil War*, will be released by Pacific Press in the spring of 2017.



Carlos Martin, professor of Evangelism and Missions, had a busy summer teaching and preaching in Beirut, Lebanon; the Greater New York Conference, New York City; the Central States Conference, Omaha, Nebraska; Medellin, Colombia; Posa Rica, Veracruz, Mexico; Manila, Philippines; the Dallas Oak Cliff Spanish Church in Texas; the North Caribbean Conference in the Virgin Islands; and several local churches in the Georgia-Cumberland Conference.



Edwin Reynolds, professor of New Testament Studies, had an article published in *Parousia 4* (2016): 99-120, a scholarly journal of the Brazilian University (UNASP), entitled "Dez chaves para interpreter o livro de Apocalipse" ("Ten Keys for Interpreting the Book of Revelation"). Another version of the article edited for lay people was published in the Portuguese edition of the *Adventist Review*. A three-hour seminar on "The Mission of the Church in the Book of Revelation" was given to pastors and elders in the Cancun area of the North Quintana Roo Conference in Mexico.



Philip Samaan, professor of Religion, Spirituality, and Adventist History, was the featured speaker at the camp meetings of the Michigan Conference and the Northern New England Conference. He was also the main presenter at the Arkansas-Louisiana Conference on Prayer and Evangelism, as well as at that conference's prayer summit for the youth. He addressed the Chesapeake Conference Men of Faith retreat. In addition, he conducted numerous seminars in the North American Division.



Barry Tryon, professor of Church Ministry and Spirituality, was the speaker at a men's ministry weekend at the Arlington Adventist Church in Arlington, Texas. The theme of the weekend was "Legacy" and focused on qualities or values that men can pass on to those they are mentoring. Presentations included "A Legacy of Faithful Obedience," "A Legacy of Impeccable Integrity," "A Legacy of Powerful Proclamation," and "A Legacy of Intentional Discipleship."

Ordination Service for Edgar Alquinta

on November 5, 2016, Edgar Alquinta, coordinator for the Evangelistic Resource Center (ERC) in the School of Religion, was ordained to the gospel ministry. Leaders of the Southern Union Conference and the Georgia-Cumberland Conference led the event, attended by students, professors, friends, and members of the Knoxville First Church.

Edgar and Pamela, his wife, were born in Chile. In his early adult years, Edgar worked as a travel agent, but in 1999 the couple made the most important dicision of their lives as they attended an evangelistic series and were baptized. They later immigrated to the United States, actively serving in their local church in Hillsboro, Oregon. Edgar's leadership skills were noticed, and the church asked him to be the church administrator, a position in which he served for three years.

While still living in Oregon, Edgar decided to study theology at Southern Adventist University (SAU). During his time at SAU, Edgar participated in three mission trips organized by the ERC . After graduation in 2009, the Georgia-Cumberland Conference sponsored Edgar to the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, where he completed his master of divinity degree with an emphasis in world mission.

For two-and-a-half years Edgar served as the senior pastor of the Knoxville SDA Church. As a pastor, he led his church in community outreach ministries that resulted in many people being added to the church and trained as disciples. In 2014 he accepted a call to be the coordinator for the ERC, working with Dr. Alan Parker and Dr. Carlos Martin in the Robert H. Pierson Institute of World Missions and Evangelism.

Since 2001, the ERC has trained and sent more than 1,100 students to preach evangelistic sermons in 35 countries. As a result of these series more than 27,000 people have been baptized.

In order to participate in these evangelistis trips, students raise a portion of the cost usually amounting to the cost of airfair alone. Other expenses such as food, lodging, and visas are subsidized by generous donations to the ERC. In addition to planning these trips, Pastor Alquinta provides training to the students so that they will be effective evangelists in places they may have never been before.

The Alquintas have been blessed with two children, Javiera and Matthew.

EC3 Held at Southern Adventist University


For the first time in its 45-year history, the Southern Union Evangelism Conference (EC3) was held on Southern's campus and hosted by the School of Religion last November. This annual event provides training, networking, and inspiration for evangelists, pastors, and church administrators. Those who attended this event rated it very highly.

A dynamic speaker lineup included well-known Adventist evangelists Roger Hernandez, Carlton Byrd, John Bradshaw, Ty Gibson, and Myron Edmonds. Plenary sessions included intriguing presentations by author James Emery White on how to reach the "nones" (those with no religious affiliation), as well as a gripping lecture on apologetics by author Alex MacFarland. Breakout sessions included seminars on preaching from Oakwood professor Charles Wesley Knight and personal evangelism by Southern professor Alan Parker. A Spanish track was conducted by Walter Castor, Frank Gonzalez, and Nilton Garcia.

The move to Southern was inspired by the desire to bring in a younger audience and to stimulate new thinking about evangelism. Junior and senior theology majors were excused from classes so they could attend the conference. They were inspired and challenged by the presentations, and glad for the opportunity to rub shoulders with pastors and leaders.

One of the many highlights for them was a banquet where Walter Pearson Jr. (from Breath of Life television) was honored for his years of service in evangelism.

The event was so successful that the School of Religion and the Southern Union Conference plan to repeat the event this fall. Make plans now to attend the next EC3 conference from November 5 through 8!

The Courage of the White Rose

As I write this, a new year and a new semester have recently begun, and as I reflect upon my hope to inspire my students with a commitment to make a difference in the world around them, I am reminded that sometimes it has been students just like them who have led the way in showing moral courage and making a positive impact on the world. Students like the group known as the White Rose.* The White Rose was the name chosen by the German students who, inspired by their commitment to Christ and galvanized by the bravery of one of their professors, decided to protest against the evils of Nazism in Germany in the 1940s.

A brother and sister, Hans and Sophie Scholl, perhaps the two most famous of these students, were not particularly committed Christians during their childhood. But as they went away to school and met some devout Christians, they began looking at Christianity in a new light. They read some Christian books and explored the Christian worldview. The Holy Spirit brought conviction to their hearts, and on December 7, 1941 (the day of the attack on Pearl Harbor), Hans wrote to a friend, "I'm thinking of you on this second Sunday of Advent, which I'm experiencing as a wholehearted Christian for the first time in my life."

As Hans and Sophie continued their university studies, they began to feel that they were responsible for what was happening in Germany. As Hans noted the evils pervading German society and saw the minimal resistance offered to these evils, he asked pointedly, "Where are the Christians?"

A turning point was reached one evening when Hans was invited to a social gathering in the home of a certain professor. The conversation turned to the subject of politics. Since the group did not know one another well, it was a dangerous subject to discuss.

Everyone present agreed that Germany was headed in the wrong direction and that evil things were happening. One person suggested that the only way to cope with the Nazis was just to hang on and try to wait out the nightmare. But philosophy professor Kurt Huber was of a different mindset. He exclaimed, "Something must be done, and it must be done now!" Professor Huber began to help the students of the White Rose, and over the next two years, they produced and distributed a number of leaflets highlighting the evils of the Nazi party.

But the inevitable happened. On Thursday, February 18, 1943, Hans and Sophie took their latest pamphlet to the university campus to distribute it personally. They were apprehended by the authorities, summarily tried and convicted,

and they were beheaded on the evening of their trials. But they had stood up for right. They had made a difference. Inspired by their commitment to Jesus Christ, influenced by godly mentors and a courageous professor, they had made a statement in favor of truth. As Sophie had stated it simply, "Somebody, after all, had to make a start."

Hans and Sophie were buried in Perlach Cemetery in Munich on February 24, 1943. In the city, graffiti appeared on the walls. It read, "Their spirit lives."

I wonder, Does their moral courage live? Does it live in the hearts and minds of the faculty and students of Southern Adventist University? Is each one of us willing to manifest the courage of our convictions and to live out what it means to be a Christian in our time?

A worthy challenge for the new year and new semester is expressed in the words of King George VI, who addressed the British people at the beginning of the year 1940. Adolph Hitler, having already conquered lands to the east, was hungry for more conquest and would soon attack western Europe. The very existence of the United Kingdom was at risk. In this dark time, King George broadcast a live message to offer reassurance to his people. He declared, "A new year is at hand. We cannot tell what it will bring. If it brings peace, how thankful we shall all be. If it brings us continued struggle we shall remain undaunted."

He then quoted from Minnie Haskins' poem "The Gate of the Year":

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown." And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

As we venture out into the moral darkness of the times in

which we live, may we place our hands into the Lord's nail-pierced hands, and may we know that being next to Him is the best and safest place to be.
