PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO GRADUATES

Dear Graduates,

Congratulations on reaching graduation and successfully preparing for your career! For much of our 125 years, Southern Adventist University has been dedicated to a holistic approach to education including mind, body, and soul. I pray that as you leave Southern and take your next steps, what you have experienced here will help you be the person God has called you to be in the setting in which He places you.

As you go, let me offer one last lesson. I have observed that smart people, even really smart people, do not seem so smart when they let their emotions—especially anger—get the best of them. Anger is the enemy of reason. Angry people do not think clearly. They often say and do things that they regret. Rarely, if ever, does anything good come from unbridled anger.

Thus, I recommend this text: "My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry," (James 1:19, NIV). For the past few years, I have tried to let this text guide my life. Being angry has never served me well and has often caused others pain. It even kept me from fully living the life God called me to live.

As you graduate from Southern Adventist University, vow that you will not let anger destroy your relationships. Resolve that you will not let it cause you to say and do things that dishonor God. Instead, be quick to listen, to respond to the needs of others. Be slow to speak, to be enamored with your own opinion, and especially to become angry. I challenge you to let James 1:19 guide your life. Live anger-free, applying what you have learned at Southern as you go on to serve others and change the world around you

THE MACE

The mace is a traditional symbol used to communicate and designate authority. The Southern Adventist University mace was crafted in 1986 by John Durichek, a Southern alum and retired professor. Southern's mace represents its heritage and raison d'être. The base is of pine from Jones Hall, built in 1917 and razed in 1985. The main staff is of walnut. The seven rings represent completeness. The four-sided ebony segment is seen as Southern's underlying educational philosophy—balanced mental, spiritual, physical, and social development for each student. The brass flames represent the Holy Spirit. Bearing the mace is the grand marshal, Chris Hansen, chair of the University Senate as well as chair and professor in the Physics and Engineering Department. His regalia is green trimmed in white, the university colors.
