A Southern Adventist University Board of Trustees meeting was held in the new Hulsey Wellness Center on February 15. The board members were very appreciative of the beautiful center but disappointed in the fact that it was more than \$1 million over budget.

Marty Hamilton gave a good explanation as to some of the causes of that overage. Most of the expenses were in the complexities of connecting the new building to the existing building.

In light of the square-foot cost of the wellness center, the budget for Florida Hospital Hall was raised to \$8 million. Tom Verrill gave a detailed explanation as to how the university plans to provide funding for the two construction projects that included a combination of loans, fundraising, and capital budget allocations.

Despite these costs, the January 2009 statement was reviewed and the university is doing very well to date. If we continue the rest of the year without any abnormal expenses, we will finish this fiscal year in good financial condition.

The board reviewed the total compensation of administration, deans, and chairs and expressed appreciation for the faculty and administration for accepting sacrificial wages to accomplish the mission of Southern.

Board members voted to authorize Southern to develop and implement a master's program in social work to begin in the fall of 2010. Another faculty member is budgeted for the social work department for this master's degree.

In addition, Ruth Liu, the chair of the Keys to Excellence Campaign gave an update on fund raising. Nearly half of the funds have been raised and various events are being planned in Chattanooga to raise the rest of the funds in time for Alumni Weekend this fall.

BECOMING AN ALL-STEINWAY SCHOOL

Professors, students, and alumni shared excitement and refreshments as they mingled in the lobby of Ackerman Auditorium in late January.

The reason these music enthusiasts were gathered was to celebrate the first shipment of 21 of the 30 new Steinway & Sons pianos. This first step toward becoming an All-Steinway School will make Southern the only Adventist school, as well as the only school in the Chattanooga area, with this designation.

After an inventory of the pianos in Mabel Wood Hall, Peter Cooper; Scott Ball; and Ted Summitt, a retired local Steinway dealer Southern alum, saw that the pianos were beyond repair. This typical situation, common among the vast majority of college-level music programs, provided an opportunity to replace the pianos with high-quality instruments.

This would also give Southern Adventist University the prestigious title of an All-Steinway School, one of three in Tennessee and the 100th in the world.

"When I heard the idea I was thrilled," says Joy McKee. "This would set us apart amongst other similar education facilities."

Each Steinway piano requires up to one year to be handcrafted, resulting in an instrument of rare quality.

"I am humbled by the excitement this project is generating," says Cooper. "I truly believe that this is a great moment for the School of Music and for all of us at Southern."

In addition to the new pianos that will be placed in teaching studios and some practice rooms, a nine-foot grand piano will go in Ackerman Auditorium. It will be used for everything from student degree recitals to guest artist recitals.

Funds for this endeavor are being raised through Southern's Keys to Excellence Campaign.

ART PROFESSOR DISPLAYS TALENT

Brian Dunne inspired students, faculty, and community members alike with his testimony, music, and artwork at the opening of his gallery show January 19.

The evening performance began in Ackerman Auditorium where Dunne shared how he realized the contrast between Christ, the ultimate artist, and Satan, the counterfeit.

"I wanted to bring out that God is the original artist. He's made us artists, but we're not original artists," Dunne says. "During my conversion with Christ, I began to notice that two huge philosophies sit at the base of art and all expressive media and that many seem naïve as to the origin of these philosophies."

During the program, Dunne illustrated the contrast between Christ and Satan through the medium of clay. Two others from the School of Visual Art and Design joined Dunne: Clint Ratliff and Loren Howard.

"One of the things that I wanted to show is that even with all our faculties and intelligence, spiritually speaking we are like the helpless lump of clay," Dunne says.

The message Dunne shared and the artwork on display impacted many who attended the event.

"I am so pleased the whole thing was so well put together," says Byron Reynolds, Collegedale resident. "It depicted well our walk with Christ and the struggles that artists have. It's so neat to be able to tie art together with spirituality."

Julie Lechler, senior psychology and nursing major agrees, "There's a lot more of a spiritual connection than I realized there would be between his art and God. It had a really a huge impact."
