NEW OUTDOOR EMERGENCY SERVICES MAJOR

Southern's outdoor education and nursing programs are working together to create a dual degree for those wanting to serve as nurses, first responders, or outdoor professionals.

This outdoor emergency services degree provides outdoor emergency certification along with an associate degree in nursing and is designed to prepare students or professionals to work in wilderness emergency settings.

Students will be able to take 34 hours of outdoor leadership classes after finishing their associate degree in nursing in order to earn their bachelor's in outdoor emergency services.

"We offer hard skills and certifications that have teeth," says Mike Hills. "These are real-world certifications, not just a bunch of classes."

According to Mike, Southern's campus and the greater Chattanooga area make the perfect "classroom" for outdoor learning.

"People know Chattanooga is the hub for places where you can offer exceptional outdoor education," he says. "This degree is an amazing opportunity for someone who wants to lead and serve."

TWO NEW RELIGION MAJORS INTRODUCED

For years, Southern students have been returning from mission and evangelistic trips eager to prepare themselves for a career in mission service at home or abroad. Now there are two new majors that will help them do just that.

The new missions major, coordinated through Southern's Evangelistic Resource Center, has been created to prepare students to serve as missionaries. The new biblical studies major will prepare students for positions of lay leadership in the church and community.

Those who will benefit from these programs include students taking a missions or biblical studies major in conjunction with another service major, students in preprofessional programs, and students interested in going on to graduate school.

"The goal is to prepare someone to be an active lay leader," says Donn Leathermann. "We want students to be equipped and knowledgeable about the Bible so they can present it to others."

CHANGES MADE TO NONPROFIT MAJOR

The nonprofit management major that resided in the School of Journalism and Communication has moved to the School of Business and Management.

"The major now has a different focus," says Carrie Harlin. "More business classes are offered that will equip students with the knowledge needed to start a nonprofit."

Along with the move, the major has undergone a few more changes within the curriculum. This nonprofit management major now offers three different concentrations: nonprofit leadership, communications, and international and community relations. Although it will keep a couple of the core classes from the School of Journalism and Communication, it will also incorporate business classes such as accounting and business law.

"This major offers training in the kinds of things that can move a nonprofit organization forward," says Robert Montague. "It is for people who have a heart for service."

LEARNING SUCCESS SERVICES

Southern is now a licensed center to administer the National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC) assessment, which is used for screening, hiring and promotion, and targeting employee training and development.

In addition it is a nationally valued credential that certifies the attainment of these workplace skills. This service is now available to all students on campus.

DISCUSSION BOARDS

Effective July 1, an online discussion forum will be available as a way to centralize communication among staff. Once logged on to www.Southern.edu/campustalk with an employee ID, the forum can be accessed for search queries or to post information.

U-Net will have four different categories. The first category, **university discussion**, will be a forum to discuss Southern-specific policies and Southern-specific news as well as higher education-related news. **Employee life** will include announcements such as weddings, prayer requests, births, deaths, hospitalizations, accidents, and illnesses. **Classified** will include ads, such as sale and wanted items, rides wanted, apartments for rent, expertise needed and offered, recommendations and requests for doctors, babysitters and restaurants. The last category, **anything goes**, is a forum for people to share and discuss current events, Internet forwards, stories, and links to photos and videos.

Employees also have the option to sign up for one or more of these categories and will receive email alerts when a new post is uploaded.

Besides the U-Net discussion forums, changes to the faculty net and southern news email distribution lists include automatically posting emails to the website where they will be available for viewing and comments.
