ENROLLMENT SURPASSES 3,000

Southern's enrollment reached a major milestone this fall with 3,053 students, more than a 5.6 percent increase from fall 2009.

Freshman enrollment, at 630, reached an all-time record number, as did graduate enrollment at 321.

In addition to record enrollment, the university achieved top tier ranking in the U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges edition for the ninth year in a row.

"Even though we're getting bigger, it's our plan to maintain the feel of a small university," says Vinita Sauder. "The university is intentionally keeping class sizes small and making certain that our students interact personally with professors and staff. This is a big benefit of attending Southern, and we plan to keep it that way."

SOUTHERN GIVING EXCEEDS \$4.1 MILLION

Private donations to Southern Adventist University totaled \$4,102,873.89* during the 2009-10 academic year.

This is the second year that the university's donors have given more than \$4 million, despite a national decline in institutional and charitable giving. This past year, the Advancement team noticed an increase in the total number of donors, the number of alumni donors, the number of employee donors, and the total dollar amount.

"Southern influences students to make a difference in the world and in God's kingdom," says Geovanny Ragsdale. "It's all about the students."

"The reason people support Southern is because of the quality of education," adds donor Ken DeFoor. "Southern prepares people to go out into the world holding onto their values."
