Harvard University was founded in 1636 as a school to train Christian ministers.

Princeton, Brown, Rutgers, and Dartmouth began as consequences of the Great Awakening, the series of religious revivals that swept the English colonies in America in the 18th century.

Today, these schools are known as secular powerhouses, a far cry from the vision of their founders. They did not set out to abandon their identity, they just went down the slippery slope slowly conforming to societal expectations, and the result was eventual separation from their founding organizations.

Their identity changed as society changed. They are fine educational institutions but bear no resemblance to their founding mission.

This is why Southern has emphasized creation research and the study of Ellen White with two new entities this year, the DNA lab in the Biology Department and the Institute for the Study of Ellen G. White and Adventist Heritage. These are only two of the many examples of how Southern employees defend the beliefs of the Seventh-day Adventist Church every day. SOUTHERN TO DROP MONTHLY INSURANCE PREMIUMS FOR FULL-TIME EMPLOYEES

Beginning December 1, 2010, full-time employees will no longer have bi-weekly health insurance premiums deducted from their paychecks. The bi-weekly charge was \$24.09 for the employee in addition to charges for spouses, children, and other dependents. Now the \$24.09 will no longer be taken out, saving full-time employees \$626 per year.

"We recognize the financial challenges many of our employees are facing during this time of economic difficulty, especially since we have gone two years without a pay increase," says Tom Verrill. "This adjustment to the healthcare contribution is our way of providing some economic relief to our employees and acknowledge their hard work while staying in line with the church's wage scale."

Spouses of full-time employees who are full-time employees themselves will both receive the deduction regardless of whether they registered independently or dependently.

NEW EDUCATION PROGRAM BEGINS

In response to a growing need for educators who know how to work with young children, Southern Adventist University will begin offering an associate's degree in early childhood education in the fall of 2011. This degree will be offered through the School of Education and Psychology.

"There is a critical need for early childhood educators in the church and outside," says Krystal Bishop.

Students in the program will be immersed in handson experiences in local early childhood programs every semester. A few of the classes included in this degree include Early Childhood Spiritual and Social Development, Creative Arts, Language Arts and Literacy, and Partners in Nurturing Young Children.
