CONNECTING WITH EACH OTHER

Improve Student Mentoring with Interaction Outside the Classroom

At this year's in-service faculty and staff were reminded by Gordon Bietz of the importance of maintaining Christian standards as defined in the *Employee Handbook*. The emphasis was not only on how they should dress and behave, but also on how they might build better relationships with the students with whom they instruct or are otherwise responsible for mentoring.

There are numerous opportunities and programs available for employees that can assist them in strengthening their connection with students outside of the classroom, making handbook rule conversations simpler and less uncomfortable:

The "Give 'em the Pickle" initiative is a new incentive program that allows all full-time employees reimbursement up to \$25 once each fiscal year for funds spent to benefit any student or students with a particular need that they deem appropriate. This could range from buying brownies for a class that did particularly well on a test to taking a few students who are struggling or discouraged out to Taco Bell for lunch. The Campus Ministries LifeGroup program is always looking for employees who are willing to take the time to host one of the many small student prayer groups on campus. Once you have hosted a group, you may contact Campus Ministries to let them know, and they will initiate a payment of \$60 into your bank account to cover the costs for food and supplies. Participating employees will be reimbursed for one hosting event per month.

Any employee who **hosts a student or students in their home** for a private meal or worship service is eligible to receive a reimbursement from Student Services



for \$5 per student for a full meal or \$2.50 per student for light refreshments. Participating employees will be reimbursed for one hosting event per month.

In the past, free meals in the Dining Hall were available to any full-time employees when they chose to dine with a student. That benefit may be available again in 2013-2014, pending final budget numbers.

Kimberly Muaya, head cashier in Accounting Services, is one of several employees who has consistently taken the time to connect with students outside of the classroom. For the past 10 years, Muaya and her husband have housed students with severe financial constraints in their home for the duration of a school year. They also regularly host Sabbath lunches and prayer meetings for students.

"We have had a wonderful experience opening our home to students," Muaya said. "I encourage employees to reach out like this or in any other way they can."
