CONNECTING WITH EACH OTHER

Senate Affirms Calendar Initiative of Adventist Educational Alliance

On Monday, October 28, Southern's Faculty Senate voted overwhelmingly in favor of synching the academic calendar more closely with that of sister schools Union College and Southwestern Adventist University. The senate's recommendation will now go before the university's Board of Trustees in February for another vote. This is the latest action taken to support the Adventist Educational Alliance, a new collaborative group designed to promote efficiency through the shared academicresources and supports ervices of these institutions.

Calendar changes include:

- Semesters begin on a Monday
- Semesters last 16 weeks
- October break reduced to one day
- Thanksgiving break increased to a full week
- Christmas break increased to three full weeks
- May graduation falls on the second Sunday of month
- Semester exam schedule changed from Sunday-Wednesday to Monday-Thursday
- Winter graduation switched to Thursday evening
- Summer Session II changed from eight to seven weeks

For several years, President Gordon Bietz and the administration have discussed how to keep Southern's tuition as low as possible, and this desire was the initial impetus behind the col-

laboration. There are multiple ways in which the alliance helps accomplish this goal, including combining 'back office' activities, such as payroll, computer services, and human resources.

Last June, registrars from Southwestern and Union visited campus to explore the possibility of using Southern's Datatel software—a robust, integrated program which encompasses areas ranging from academics to housing to financial aid—for their schools as well. Joni Zier, director of Records and Advisement at Southern, believes a centralized process would help cut costs without putting any additional strain on Southern.

"Our system is more than big enough to fit information from all three of our schools and still run efficiently," Zier said.

Another way this collaboration could keep costs down and limit tuition increases would be through academic collaboration. There are certain small, specialty classes offered at all three schools that only have six to eight students. As older professors retire, only one professor would be required for one online class offered to each of the three universities. Additionally, while Southern may offer certain classes only every Fall or Winter Semester, students who need them to graduate will be able to take those classes online from either Southwestern or Union in the alternate semesters without waiting.

Marc Grundy, vice president for Enrollment Services, has been involved in the discussions of this alliance and believes that along with the benefits to each institution, the collaboration is the right thing to do from a spiritual perspective as well.

"We should work together because God has called us to help each other," Grundy said.
